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Potential for Innovation through Public Procurement

Big volume:

Over 250,000 public authorities in the EU spend around 14% of GDP on the purchase of services, works and supplies.


Policy lever:

Public Procurement is recognized as a strategic instrument for achieving policy objectives such as sustainable growth, support of small and mediumsized enterprises (SMEs) or innovation.

Challenges for national, regional and local authorities: ۲

Using Public Procurement strategically for innovation requires capabilities; 70% to 80% of public investments in Europe are made by local and regional authorities.




Modernising Public Procurement - General Aspects

- innovation fostering instruments
- simpler and more flexible procedures
- better access for SMEs
- cross-border joint public procurement
- cross-cutting issues
- innovation agencies, buyers groups
- role of Central Purchasing Bodies
- electronic means, digitalisation of the complete procurement process
- sound procurement cycle (needs assessment, market dialogue, tender specifications, contract management, reviews, measurement)







Modernising Public Procurement in the EU

New Directives 2014/23/EU, **2014/24/EU**, **2014/25/EU** replaced Directives 2004/18/EG, 2004/17/EG

- objectives of the Europe 2020 Strategy for smart, sustainable and inclusive growth
- best strategic use to spur innovation
- facilitation of transnational actions
- Innovation Procurement, Innovation Partnership
- life-cycle costing / best price-quality ratio
- implementing e-procurement
- principles of transparency, competition and ...

By 18 April 2016, EU countries had to transpose the three directives into national law.



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OECD Survey on Public Procurement for Innovation

Response rate: 28 OECD member countries (80%) plus 7 OECD non-member countries


Part I: more **policy-oriented**, based on 6 questions of the "ERAC-Questionnaire on Innovation Procurement 2014"; Public procurement is getting from a more limited administrative procedure towards a **"smart"** procurement management, including Strategic Innovation Procurement.

Part II: based on the OECD Observatory Public Sector Innovation Survey (OPSI) and focused on the typology of public procurement, especially on the use of strategic innovation procurement; Most respondents have sent a **good practice case** on Strategic Innovation Procurement on national or sub-national level.

OECD Survey: Key Findings - Status quo of Implementation





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OECD Survey: Key Findings - Main Challenges



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OECD Report: Framework towards Strategic Public Procurement

Nine areas for action identified:

- policy strategies with defined targets.
- legal framework
- encourage sound management and leadership in administration.
- financial support.
- professionalisation and capacity building.
- Raising awareness and early stakeholder engagement.
- risk management and measurement
- standardisation
- e-procurement

Some Examples for Capacity Building





European Assistance for Innovation Procurement "eafip" (CSA 2015-2017).

- promotion of innovation procurement focused on ICT based solutions
- training and assistance to public
- best practices in innovation procurement

Key components of the initiative:

- Identification and establishment of contacts with key public procurers
- Preparation of a Toolkit to assist policy makers, public procurers and legal services
- Provision of assistance for the design and implementation of PCP/PPI ۲
- EU-wide events to raise awareness about PCP and PPI and workshops providing good practice approaches





Competence Centre for Innovative Procurement "KOINNO"

- set up 2013 by the Association Materials Management, Purchasing and Logistics e.V. (BME) for the Federal Ministry for Economic Affairs and Energy (BMWi)
- After evaluation, in 2017 enhanced by the German "EU Contact Point" for Public Procurement of Innovation at ZENIT in collaboration with the German NCP for PCP/PPI at DLR-PT

Key components of the EU Contact Point:

- Information: topic related events, exchange of experience workshops to public procurers
- Advice: Initial individual advice, assessment of project ideas, funding recommendations
- Support: proposal coaching, proposal check, forming of strategic consortia

MLE on Innovation Procurement:

- Topic A: Strategic Framework
- Topic B: Capacity Building
- Topic C: Financial and other enabling incentives and resources
- Topic D: Measurement, Evaluation and Monitoring
