EUIMA – Full Costing Study Visit to the University of Birmingham 25- 27 October 2011

The University of Birmingham has been selected to host the study visit due to its recognised extensive experience with the implementation of full costing and its integrated use in the strategic management of the university. Specifically, the study visit has been tailored to those who wish to gain experience in the implementation of full costing from the perspective of a university with a comprehensive mission to balance teaching, research and social outreach activities.

The University of Birmingham

Founded in 1900 as the UK's first redbrick university, Birmingham established a new model for higher education, breaking away from the Oxbridge tradition. Through the foresight of its founders the University of Birmingham has inherited one of its greatest assets – a beautiful parkland campus, located less than five miles from the city centre.

The University of Birmingham is one of the world's great universities, ranked amongst the top 50 universities in Europe (Times Higher Education) and top 100 universities in the world (Shanghai Jiao Tong). Today with approximately 27,000 students and 6,000 staff, and as one of the Russell Group Institutions, its main focus remains on research through a range of subjects in its five colleges; Medical and Dental Science; Engineering and Physical Sciences; Life and Environmental Sciences; Arts and Law and Social Sciences.

With a strong leadership team in place, the University of Birmingham is now embarking on a new Strategic Framework which embraces the university as a civic, national and global organisation. Birmingham is one of the strongest universities financially in the UK with a turnover of £460m which continues to grow enabling it to further invest in estate and infrastructure.

Full Costing at the University of Birmingham

The University of Birmingham was a pilot project for Full Economic Costing (FEC) from 1998 and began implementing the approach in 2000 for research grants and contracts. In addition, the principles of full costing are used to calculate charge-out rates for Research Facilities & Equipment. The university has also recently developed a software tool for calculating the full costs of research projects.

TRAC (Transparent Approach to Costing) is used to determine the full costs of all university activities (Teaching, Research, Other) and is also used to show the full costs of Colleges and Schools within the university. Therefore, TRAC is of significant importance in understanding the financial performance of the university and helps to identify key financial indicators to inform decision making across the university.

The university has a dedicated team of accountants entrusted to produce the TRAC and FEC financial information and communicate it to colleagues at all levels within the university from Senior Management to Budget Holders within Colleges and Schools. A number of strategic developments are currently being considered for TRAC including using it to inform Teaching Course costing, resource allocation and workload management for university staff.

Study visit programme

The one and a half day study visit programme has been designed to provide an excellent and intensive learning experience for a variety of university staff profiles, including university leadership representatives and administration/management delegates. Participants will be invited to join the welcome dinner on the evening before the start of the study visit where they will be introduced to the host university's leadership and other participants. The event will offer a unique opportunity for participants to learn about the results of the recent review of the UK full costing methodology, which will be presented by experts from leading universities and other stakeholders in the field. At the beginning of the first day a detailed overview of the implementation of full costing at the University of Birmingham will be provided, while later sessions will focus on specific operational aspects and strategic uses of full costing at other UK and foreign universities.
